

Updates from Lindley Elementary

Did you know?? Lindley Elementary was built in 1928, making it the second oldest school in Guilford County! Lindley Park is fortunate to have such a wonderful school in the middle of the neighborhood. With so many invested families, it is truly a "neighborhood" school. One of the best ways to keep a neighborhood school strong is for the neighborhood to be involved! There are many ways you can be involved at Lindley, even if you don't have children who attend, such as by volunteering or supporting programs. Here are some things going and ways to plug in:

The Garden - The Lindley Garden has become a special place for Lindley students to grow and eat their own vegetables and fruits. Digging for sweet potatoes or tasting fresh peas off the vine is a unique opportunity for many! Look for late spring/summer farmers markets on campus and possibly a booth at the Curb Market. Neighbors are welcome to visit the garden, but please leave the vegetables so students can enjoy the fruits of their labors!

Gifts of Generosity - Through an anonymous donor, students at Lindley will have the opportunity to select a charity and be "donors" by making a contribution as a class. It is a meaningful experience for all children to work together to decide as a group which charity to support and creatively come up with ways to increase their contributions!

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Lindley Park Home Sales

Each year, as I review the home sales data for our neighborhood, and think back over the previous 12 months I am always surprised how well we do – despite the economy, and despite the media saying home sales and values are down. Yes, 2011 did turn out to be another very challenging year for home sales. Fewer buyers were out shopping for houses.

And, due to a larger inventory across the City, these buyers could afford to be picky. The outcome in Greensboro, on average, was houses stayed on the market longer, prospective sellers had to do more to attract buyers and had to tighten up their list prices. In our own 27403 zip code, 146 houses sold. The average price was \$149,394. The sale price percentage to list price was 93.2%.Days on market (DOM) was 143.9 days.

But, as you will see from the table, Lindley Park did a little bit better in 2011. While fewer houses sold in the neighborhood last year, the average sale price went up a little over 1.5%. And, the average close price per square foot went up by \$2.00 per square foot.

These increases were due in part to size and style of the homes sold. More period styles like bungalows, Cape Cod and Tudor style homes were clear favorites. But, most 3 bedrooms, 2 full bath homes no matter the age or style got a lot of attention if these homes were priced right and in good condition. In the end, homebuyers were able to net 96.5% of their list price. Please remember that these figures are averages. Not all houses sold for 96.5% of the list price. Unfortunately, Lindley Park was not immune to foreclosures. Several foreclosed properties sold in our neighborhood during 2011.

While 2012 is getting off to another cautious start, newly listed houses in Lindley Park are starting to sprout up on the market just like spring flowers. In turn, prospective buyers are checking out Open Houses, real estate websites and talking with current Lindley Park homeowners to find out what might be coming on the market. 2012 will also bring new property values set by the Guilford County tax department. Last time a reevaluation occurred was 2004. It will be interesting to see how our neighborhood fares during this challenging economic time.

As the weather warms, flowers start to bloom – Lindley Park will be at its best. So, if you are thinking about putting your house on the market – use this slower time wisely. Get your house ready. Consider a pre-listing home inspection to make sure your home does not have any hidden problems. Work on your curb appeal. Freshen up the inside with paint.

Lindley Park will always continue to be a sought after destination for many prospective homeowners. Besides the obvious- tree lined streets, the Park, sidewalks, walking distance to restaurants, stores and an elementary school, we have so much more. 
Do you like being a Schipperke?

Dogged By Obesity

Man's best friend is battling one of man's worst enemies -- obesity. Up to 40% of dogs in the U.S. weigh too much. Like people, overweight dogs are at risk for health problems, from arthritis to heart disease. This is one challenge you and your pet can face together. Research suggests people who exercise with their dogs are more likely to stick to a fitness program. The key is finding activities you both enjoy.

Walking

Brisk walking is an ideal exercise for human and hound. The benefits include a stronger heart, lower blood pressure, more energy, denser bones, and a lower risk of depression. In dogs, regular walks can also reduce common behavior problems. A trip to the vet for your dog and a doctor's checkup for you is recommended before starting an exercise program.

Jogging

Not all dogs are built to jog. Greyhounds, for example, are pros at short-distance sprinting, but can become fatigued during long-distance runs. If you want to jog with your dog, choose a breed that is suited to distance-running, such as a Labrador. Wait until your pup is full grown and then gradually build up to a 30-minute excursion. This should include five minutes of warm-up, 20 minutes of jogging, and five minutes of cooldown. Remember that dogs can't sweat, so avoid the hot times of the day and stop if your dog is lagging behind you.

Agility Training

Agility training is another popular goal-oriented sport. Your dog races through an obstacle course with ladders, hurdles and tunnels, while you run alongside offering praise and encouragement. The fast pace provides both of you with an excellent cardiovascular workout, while your dog also develops improved coordination. Participate in organized competitions or look for a park with an agility course you can use on your own time.

Soccer

If you're a soccer fanatic, why not make your dog a fan, too? Check your pet supply store for soccer-style exercise balls for dogs. These are made of hard plastic and come in different sizes to suit your particular breed. You kick the ball, and your dog tries to pass it back with his nose or paws. You can also use a regular soccer ball made for people -- just be careful about kicking the ball directly at your dog's face or body.



Fetch


Fetching a ball or favorite toy over and over can be great exercise for your dog. But it doesn't do much for you, if you're just standing there tossing. Instead, make a game of fetch part of your home workout routine. Do lunges or abdominal crunches as you throw the ball. You might build more muscle by throwing a heavy ball, but a soft, lightweight toy is safest for your dog's mouth

Establishing a Routine

Develop a workout routine that's realistic, considering your job schedule and other demands on your time. Also consider your dog's needs -- working breeds and juvenile dogs usually need a lot of exercise. Start with a short-term goal of exercising just five or 10 minutes every day. Gradually work up to 30 minutes on most days of the week. Keep in mind that deep-chested breeds, such as Danes or Doberman pinschers, should not exercise right after meals.

Gentle Exercises for Older Dogs Just because your senior dog moves with a slower, stiffer gait then when he was a pup doesn't mean he should stop exercising. Senior dogs, especially those with arthritis, not only can exercise -- in many cases, they should. Exercise helps increase flexibility and endurance, strengthens muscles around the joints, and can help stave off health problems caused by obesity. Exercise also aids bowel function, which is especially important in older dogs. And, since obesity tends to make arthritis worse, any activity that helps your dog lose weight could ease his symptoms in the long run. Try low-impact exercises, such as swimming and moderate walking, with your old fellow.

Greensboro Neighborhood Congress

The LPNA is a member of the Greensboro Neighborhood Congress (GNC), a citywide alliance of neighborhoods. The objective of the GNC is to improve the quality of life within the City of Greensboro by addressing issues of citywide importance to neighborhoods and by empowering neighborhoods to resolve neighborhood-specific concerns.

Representatives from member groups meet monthly at open meetings. The next meeting is March 10, 9-11 a.m. at the Central public library. Our January meeting included information about our upcoming property tax revaluations and was summarized in our meeting notes as follows:

Ben Chavis, Guilford County Tax Director, explained what to expect from the County's 2012 property tax revaluations, which will be mailed to taxpayers in March 2012. Our County has approx. 164,000 residential properties and approx. 44,000 commercial properties with a total tax base of approx. \$44 billion appraised by thirteen appraisal professionals. State law requires county tax revaluations for all real property (land and buildings) every 8 years. Property reassessment is intended to determine the "most likely price that the property would sell for". Although property tax rates may increase slightly, property tax values may be reduced slightly to reflect currently depressed housing sale values. The combination of current tax rates and tax values suggests that most property owners will not experience extreme tax fluctuation. Newly implemented property tax software allows tax appraisers to create more equitable appraisals across 2,500 neighborhoods, to track all real property sales across the County, to see tax anomalies and correct them, and to create a schedule of tax values in which properties are appraised across comparable locations. Every citizen has the right of legitimate property tax appeal. Appeal forms are provided with your tax assessment mailing. After this property tax revaluation, your appeal may be elevated to the County Board of Equalization and Review. 
