
We're electing new Lindley Park **Neighborhood Association officers at** our general meeting on January 28, 2014.

Chairman: Presides over all meetings which include monthly board meetings and 3 times a year General Member meetings. Acts as liaison with other groups who impact and or are impacted by the Lindley Park

neighborhood. Responsible for establishing or maintaining standing committees and neighborhood district representatives. Sets the tone for Association communication through the email List Serve, Facebook page,



Vice Chairman: Fills in for Chairman as needed. Assists with standing committees as needed. This position is often training ground for the Chairman role and serves in various ways.

Secretary: Attends all meetings, records notes and submits minutes for approval. Assists Chairman with prior meeting communication and is responsible for official Association correspondence.

Treasurer: Custodian of the Association's funds. Maintains bank accounts, pays invoices, and collects money from members and for fundraising activities. Prepares annual budget with Chairman and gives regular updates at meetings.

Parliamentarian: Advises the presiding officer and Association members on their respective parliamentary rights as needed.

There shall be an executive board which shall consist of the five officers, the immediate past chairman of the Association, the chairmen of the standing committees, and a district representative for each of the neighborhood districts as established by the Executive Board. The officers and other members of the Executive Board shall be elected from the general membership at the first meeting of each calendar year.

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FROM THE CHAIR

As the holidays are upon us, we need to be reminded that the two times of year that are the most common to be the victim of a break-in is 1) summer and 2) Christmas. A quick Google search for "Christmas Burglaries" brings up story after story of families that have had their season ruined. So how can we protect ourselves? We have written several times in the past about how to keep your home in a condition that deters thieves. Stephen Way, a resident of Lindley Park, our Public Safety Chair and an employee of GPD's CSI, has written about this and offered to help educate people as well. If you haven't already looked at www.crimemapping.com, you need to. It is a site set up for the GPD that maps all crimes and gives you a feel for what to look out for in Lindley Park and the rest of the city. Lastly, the neighborhood List Serve is there to help in situations where you feel something just isn't right. In the past, this has been pushy door to door salespeople or people seeming to "wander" the neighborhood. Burglaries have been interrupted because concerned neighbors took the time to raise the alarm. Remember, it can be anything that causes concern. When we have had the GPD come and talk to us in the past, they stress to not wait – if your gut is telling you that something isn't right, call 911 first and then send a note to lpnagso@gmail. com. We will send a note out to more than 200 neighbors right away. Together we can help keep our neighborhood safe this holiday season.

The HOPE sign was the creative vision of our talented, inspiring neighbor Lucy "Goosey" Newsom (who, at age 13, is also the editor of young people's neighborhood newspaper The Lindley Park Gazette) and started out in 2008. 

LINDLEY ELEMENTARY - A TRIP DOWN MEMORY LANE

In the past two years Helene Romer-Speaks and I have reconnected. We are Lindley alumni from the 1960s - Helene (1962-1968) and myself (1961-1967). We attended the recent 85th anniversary of Lindley Elementary and had a wonderful time seeing the school again. I had been back twice since "graduating" from Lindley (and I voted there for a number of years) but I don't think Helene had been back at all.

The school had the same familiar and welcoming atmosphere we remembered. Both of us agree that we LOVED Lindley Elementary and are less attached to our junior high and senior high schools. After we registered, just about the first place we went was by Mrs. Booker's classroom; she was our first grade teacher. We had two more of the same teachers: Mrs. Stewart for second grade and Mrs. Bullock for third grade. For fourth grade, I had Mrs. Ariail and Helene had Mrs. Eargle, in fifth grade, Helene had Mrs. Thomas and I had Mrs. Lineberry and for sixth, I had Ms. Kern and Helene had Ms. Laughter. We found Mrs. Stewart's and Mrs. Bullock's classrooms and the Principal's Office. Mr. Gardner was the principal for the entire time we were at Lindley. Mrs. Bullock was a favorite teacher for both of us – she let us make our own class book with our

stories, poems and artwork. I still have my mimeographed copy!

And we both remembered Mrs. Cooper, the librarian. The Library was upstairs in the 1960s but now Lindley boasts a lovely new Media Center on the first floor – wouldn't Mrs. Cooper have loved that? We were delighted to see the restored auditorium - it looked a little smaller than we remembered! We ventured down to the gymnasium, where Mr. Cox, a roving physical educational instructor for the system, was remembered, and then to the cafeteria. The gym looked the same and the cafeteria nearly the same - the lunch line was the same but the water fixture was gone where you waited in line. For us (and I expect many Lindley alums), the feature we most missed were the "grass steps." For those new to the neighborhood, it was an amphitheatre which would seat the entire student body. May Day programs would be presented there.

Helene and I were not in the same grade during our Lindley years. We were friends because she lived nearby one of the girls in my class, Allison Sadler. And yes, we would play with our Barbie dolls at Allison's! Circumstances brought us back together in our late 50s and we believe that our shared

back ground at Lindley is the basis for our friendship today. Our respective parents bought homes in Lindlev Park with the idea that we would both walk to school - and we did! It was a "neighborhood school" in the best sense of that term. And we both had memories of Fifth Grade Camp where the two fifth grade classes would spend a week down at William B. Umstead State Park in Raleigh.

We were determined to "relive" our Lindley days. This is why Helene and her husband Bobby Speaks drove from their home in Charlotte and I hurried home from attending Friends Meeting on Sunday, September 29th, to meet them and attend the reunion together. We are now the proud new owners of Lindley Elementary School tee-shirts and we have linked our Harris Teeter cards to help Lindley (the number is 2872 if anyone else would like to help our neighborhood school). We had such fun looking at the class pictures and even found ours. Helene has her things in a nice, neat scrapbook. Mine are "who knows where?" but I intend to find my Lindley memorabilia and get in all in one place and eventually donate it to the school. It warmed our hearts to see the school we loved so much flourishing and especially to see the students and parents of today taking the same interest in it that our families did.

LITTLE FREE LIBRARY COMING TO LINDLEY PARK

Lindley Park will soon have its own branches of the Little Free Library. The free library boxes will be located on Walker Avenue near the corner of Walker and Westdale Place.

TAKE A BOOK; RETURN A BOOK

Little Free Library, is a "take a book, return a book" site where neighbors share their favorite literature and stories. In its most basic form, a Little Free Library is a box full of books where anyone may stop by and pick up a book (or two) and bring back another book to share.

The first Little Free Library was started in 2009 by Todd Bol of Hudson, Wisconsin. His first library was built as a tribute to his mother, a former school teacher who loved reading. He filled it with books and put it on a post in his front yard. His neighbors and friends loved it. He built several more and gave them away. Each one had a sign that said FREE BOOKS.

By 2011 local, regional and national media attention to the backyard project turned it into a movement.

In May 2012 Little Free Library was officially

established as a nonprofit corporation. By the end of 2013 it is estimated there will be 15,000 Little Free Libraries in 55 countries.

The mission of The Little Free Library is:

- To promote literacy and the love of reading by building free book exchanges worldwide.
- To build a sense of community as we share skills, creativity and wisdom across genera-

The Lindley Park Little Free Library will have two separate book boxes - one for adult books and a separate "children's library" for

1 small onion—chopped

2 cloves garlic—minced

1 tablespoon vegetable oil

1 can refried beans—31 oz

1 can diced tomatoes (undrained)—16 oz

1 can Rotel tomatoes (undrained)—10

1 can chicken broth—14.5 oz

Garnishes (as desired): crushed tortilla chips, shredded cheese, sour cream, cilantro, chopped onion, pickled or fresh jalapenos

Cook onion and garlic in oil in a Dutch oven over medium-high heat, stirring constantly, until tender. Add beans, both tomatoes and chicken broth, stirring until smooth. Be sure to mash the lumps of refried beans until completely dissolved. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and simmer 15 minutes.






