

Those Park Markers and Plans

If you have been by the park between Lindell and Willowbrook lately, you may have noticed the pink tape on trees, stakes with tape tied to them, and spray-painted triangles, etc on the street. Or you've seen the surveyors who are responsible for them. They are working to create a park map, including topography and the location of trees larger than 4" in diameter. The markings locate places that they have measured, since the process will take some weeks for the surveyors to complete.

The map is being created by the Parks & Recreation Department. It will allow us to create a landscape plan that builds on the original 1997 plan, which planted most of the trees and shrubs currently in the park. There were a number of flowers and grasses on that plan that didn't get planted. Some of them are now recognized as invasive non-natives that would not be planted today. We will focus on native and non-invasive plants as we develop the new plan. This will be very much a neighborhood effort, and if you have any thoughts on how you would like to see the park develop, please reach out to me at elizlink04@gmail.com.

As we move into spring you might be thinking about what to plant in your own yard. If you're looking for native plants that will brighten up the yard, and provide food for birds and pollinators, consider False Indigo (*Baptisia* species), Purple Coneflower (*Echinacea purpurea*) and other coneflowers, and Black-eyed Susan (*Rudbeckia fulgida*). These are all hardy species that like sun or part shade. Woodland Phlox (*Phlox divaricata*) does well in full shade, and Moss Phlox (*Phlox subulata*) does well in full sun. Foxglove Beardtongue (*Penstemon digitalis*), Goldenrod (*Solidago*) and Bee Balm (*Monarda*) species are other hardy species that are highly adaptable to soil conditions and full to part sun.

If looking for a source of native plants, our neighbor John Neal grows and sells great native plants as **Neal's Natives**. To sign up for emails about what, when and where he'll be selling them, send him an email at nealsnatives@gmail.com. He will also be having a driveway sale on **April 13, from 9 a.m. to 1p.m., at 2705 Camden Rd.**

Another source for natives is **Guilford Garden Center**, which has a location on Milner Dr. across from Quaker Village, and has just expanded to the old New Garden Nursery location on Lawndale Dr.








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

Just one table's efforts...

Exercise your Inner Composter! Without the Actual Work!!



If you would love to compost, but just can't seem to pull it together (like me!), be aware that now you can get someone to do the hard for you! And help keep all kinds of useful material out of the landfill. Bodacious!!

The city now has two locations where residents can drop off food scraps, *including meat, bones, etc*, for processing into compost. It's amazing how little trash you will see your household producing once you're recycling and dropping off food waste.

And no more leaky, stinky garbage!

Just collect the food scrap in a bucket - a paint bucket from the big box store works great - and when it's full dump it in the proper container when you're on an errand near either of the current drop-off locations:

The original spot (and still the biggest):

Deep Roots Market 600 N. Eugene St. (at the back of the parking lot)

OR, even closer to the 'hood:

Congregational United Church of Christ 400 W. Radiance Dr. (in the parking lot across *East* Radiance Dr.)

The Corner Farmers Market - 2024 By the Numbers

If you haven't visited our neighborhood market in a while, you might be surprised to learn how far we've come. As we wrap up our **11th year**, our scrappy little market has grown **1400**% percent, from a start of **3 farmers** to a steady average of **45** vendors.

When you shop at The Corner you are supporting:

- ⇒ 13 farms: nearly all of whom are first-generation farmers with a few multi-generation farms providing mentorship. For most farms, our market is their main, or only, outlet for sales, and you keep them growing strong! Our farms bring fresh produce, eggs, and locally raised meats.
- ⇒ **5 bakers:** offering French bread and pastries, bagels, sourdough, artisan sweet treats and more. We recently coaxed *Breadservice* back to the market to help alleviate the 11am bread crisis!
- ⇒ **Prepared foods from more than a dozen chefs**: offering Mexican, Palestinian, Lebanese, Trinidadian, Australian, French, Puerto Rican, Sicilian, Congolese, and Cajun dishes. Plus, American standards.
- ⇒ **13 specialty vendors:** an apiary, coffee roaster, bean-to-bar chocolate makers, knife sharpener, fishmonger, soap maker, winery, juicer. vegan baker, allergen free baker, and fermenter.
- ⇒ 5-10 rotating spotlights: local artists, food pop-ups, food trucks new experiences each week
- ⇒ 1 rotating free spot: for young entrepreneurs, scouts, non-profits, services, etc.

Plus, a weekly kids make-and-take tent, rotating buskers, and all sorts of surprises. And **one** plucky little chicken the kids play hide and seek with.

In 2024, you dug deep to feed your neighbors. The Green for Greens program put more than \$77,000 in fresh foods in the baskets of our neighbors receiving a SNAP benefit. And that means \$77,000 went to the vendors we all know and love, and didn't go to big chains selling "fake-fresh" foods shipped in from... wherever! In 2024, our Green for Greens SNAP matching fund was entirely community-funded!

For perspective let's zoom in on just a couple of items. You purchased more than **14,625 pounds of tomatoes** in 2024. Nik of *Sunhouse*, who started farming on the heels of COVID, says in 2020 he sold **150 lbs** of tomatoes. This year he grew and sold **2,525 lbs**. That is **1,588% growth.** In just four years. And it was a great year for peaches as well: **4,400 lbs worth** at The Corner. Next year we may have fresh peach ice cream too!

There is also a way to invest up front, essentially giving the farmers seed money, and reaping the cream of the crop each week. *Sun and Soil, Sunhouse*, and *Faucette Farms* offer produce CSAs. Combined, they fill almost **200 pre-paid customer CSA orders every week**. *Faucette* has open sign-ups now, and you can check with the others for their enrollment schedules.

When we buy fresh food at the farmers' market, we want to make sure nothing goes to waste. *Sun and Soil Farm* offers a compost service. Buy a bucket, bring it back each week with your food scraps and get a fresh bucket for a small fee. Sun and Soil diverted **4,700 pounds of food waste** from the landfill in 2024.

Thank you for being a vital part of this ecosystem that revolves around **The Corner**.

The Corner Farmer's Market operates year-round every Saturday morning from 8am-noon. It's located at 2105 W. Market Street in the parking lot of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church.

The market matches SNAP benefits through their Green for Greens Fund. SNAP recipients can bring their benefits card to the yellow market tent to match up to \$50 each week to spend at the market.

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Neighborhood Speed Changes



You may have noticed some new speed limit signage recently in the 'hood. As you may or may not know, under NC law streets that are not posted otherwise 'default' to 35 mph. That seemed far too fast for a neighborhood with on-again/off-again sidewalks and substantial foot traffic. After working with the Greensboro Dept. of Transportation for several months, new 25 mph speed limits have now been posted on five LP streets – Cliff-side Terrace/Masonic Dr., Scott Ave., Howard St., Longview St. and Sherwood St. As a follow-up to the change, G-DOT is also rotating digital speed sensors among those streets to help alert drivers to what 25 mph 'feels' like. Our original request to G-DOT encompassed all neighborhood streets, but we were allowed to make the request for only a few. As a start, we chose the streets that tend to be the most impacted by traffic going to or coming from Spring Garden St.

Aside from (hopefully) some slower speeds on those streets, the reduction to 25 mph also makes them eligible for consideration for additional speed reduction strategies under G-DOT's Neighborhood Traffic Management Program (NTMP) which they introduced last year.

LPNA thanks **Dyan Arkin** and **Maury Schott** for working with G-DOT on our behalf, and **Marty Noe** for his advocacy on the Cliffside Terrace/Masonic Dr. reduction.

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Traffic Issue?



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A Hope Hub Partner: Beyond Sports

Beginning training for junior athletes is a significant commitment in both time and money. The cost of equipment, training, and access to fields and arenas is often beyond what many families can afford. As a result, there are significant gaps for those with limited access to high school sports, which can teach valuable life lessons in time management, sportsmanship, perseverance, and inner strength.

Mike Kennedy and **Michaela Daly** recognized this gap, both from their own experiences and their time coaching young athletes. They wanted to level the playing field and ensure that all youth had access to the opportunity to learn sports, engage in teamwork, and benefit from the many lessons that youth sports can provide. Their passion led to the creation of **Beyond Sports**, a growing local and regional organization. The name reflects the belief that sports offer youth more than just physical activity—it's about the life lessons that come with it. Access to equipment, training, and fields is just the start.

Their mission goes beyond simply providing access to sports. They aim to use sports as a vehicle for building stronger connections across economic, racial, and gender lines. Having witnessed the power of sports firsthand, Mike and Michaela are dedicated to ensuring that all youth have access to these opportunities.

Beyond Sports began as a program in a handful of local schools, including Kiser Middle School and Wash-

ington Elementary. They enlisted college and local professional athletes to introduce students to sports they might not have heard of—like rowing, wrestling, and golf. They followed this by offering students the chance to join local amateur clubs at lower-cost rates to continue learning and developing their skills. Beyond Sports aims to disrupt the trend where, by middle school, it's often too late for students to pick up sports like soccer or golf and experience success.

Achieving these goals requires funding. Mike and Michaela have built a coalition of support and successfully won grants to bring their vision to life. Their facility at **The Hope Hub** in Lindley Park provides a warehouse of sports equipment available to local school athletes, either through team or individual requests. **The Hub** also houses offices and hosts team building events for special projects. Most recently, they hosted an after-school team building and service-learning event for the Recess Champions from Washington Elementary.
